Mike's Minutes

Closing in on colder weather. I can't say that I'm ready...I hate the cold...but these 65 degree nights have sure been nice and the yard crew sure are enjoying the 80 degree days instead of the 100's we had there for a while.

As things start going south (literally and figuratively) for the Winter, it's time

for you to start thinking of winterizing your pond and taking care of its inhabitants.

First, let's talk about plants. When

leaves and stalks start yellowing and drooping, remove them from the pond. If you're thinking about netting over the top you may have to think about cutting tall plants like cattails, umbrella palms and rushes down now while you can still get in the pond to do it and remove all the cuttings. Probably after the first freeze, you'll lose all your lily pads and they'll be ready to cut back and if potted, moved to the lowest level of the pond. Tropical plants may be moved indoors to winter over or treated as annuals and added to the compost pile to be replaced next year.

Now fish. If your pond is going to run all winter, leave the fish in there as long as it is 24" or greater in depth. Water temps here are ranging from 70 in the smaller ponds to 74/75 in the larger. We're still feeding a high quality food and will continue until water temps hit 65 when we will change to a cold weather specific food. The cold weather formula is lower in protein (around 32% vs. 36/37%). At water tempera-

tures of 55 we will quit feeding altogether. You also must insure a hole is open in the surface as ice occurs to allow for gas transfer. This may be accomplished through use of a deicer or aerator. Some waterfalls provide enough flow that there is no danger of a solid freeze.



We are assembling the frame for the net over the Renaissance pond. We'll put the net on it soon as leaves are already beginning to fall.

Finally, equipment. Most everything is meant to be left in place but you should make certain pressurized filters not buried or otherwise protected are winterized following the manufacturer's directions. You'll want to make sure your skimmers are cleaned regularly this time of year as the leaves will clog them quickly and starve your pump if you're not diligent. Many ponders like to do a good cleaning this time of year to help the pond ecosystem winter over better. The more work you do now removing leaves, debris, plant materials and waste, the less you'll have to do in the spring. In our part

of the country it's almost time to turn off, remove and clean UV lights and store them safely for the winter. There shouldn't' be

much algae growing as the water cools down. If your light is installed in such a way that you can't remove it, at least unplug it now and winterize it as best you can to keep it from freezing and breaking ... Mike
